



Religious Emblems Programs Available to Members of the Boy Scouts of America

A Scout is reverent. He is reverent toward God. He is faithful in his religious duties and respects the convictions of others in matters of custom and religion.

To encourage members to grow stronger in their faith, religious groups have developed the following religious emblems programs. The Boy Scouts of America has approved of these programs and allows the emblems to be worn on the official uniform. The various religious groups administer the programs. Check with your local council service center or contact the religious committee to obtain the curriculum information.

Materials with a Boy Scouts of America supply number are available from your local council service center or from the BSA National Distribution Center toll-free at 800-323-0732.

For additional information about religious emblems, please contact your religious organization.

How Do We Get Started on These Programs?

- 1. Youth members or their parents obtain the specific information for their religious emblems.
- 2. Parents review the program guidelines.
- 3. Families talk with their religious leaders or emblem counselors and show them the requirements before beginning the program.
- 4. The youth member completes the requirements and the family obtains the proper signatures and orders the emblem.




All participants are required to arrive on time Friday (or Thursday for Sunday Friendly Courses) mornings and remain in camp during both 3-day sessions. They must participate in all course activities, events and lessons, camping overnight, until each session's closing. In addition to the two weekend sessions, there are two intersession patrol meetings that must be attended, too. Following the practical experience, each participant commits to complete the application phase over the following 18 months.

Course Costs:

Total cost for the **course** is **only \$300** and includes training materials, Wood Badge recognition items, food, and camping fees. Pre-registration is required, preferably at least 30 days prior to the start of the course. Participants will be accepted based upon the date the application is received. Courses have been filling up quickly to their maximum; so pre-register early.

Course Uniform:

For the course, Scouters will need a complete field uniform for the program or position in which they are registered. This should include shirt, pants, or shorts with the appropriate socks and belt. Information on other clothing and equipment needs will be provided to each registered participant prior to the course.

National Commissioner's Minute

It has been a year since I assumed the role of your national commissioner. I am convinced more than ever that commissioners are the "glue and grease" of Scouting. In looking back over the year, it is apparent to me that you have accomplished a great deal. Since last May, you have welcomed girls into Cub Scouting and Scouts BSA. You have made more unit visits than ever before, helped establish new units, and guided leaders through changes involved in having girls join Scouting. Well done!

Family Scouting has been an adventure for all of us. What a wonderful opportunity for these girls and for the BSA. From what I can tell, everyone—boys and girls, along with their parents—is loving it. It's an exciting time for the BSA, to say the least.

This last year, recorded and counted unit visits reached an all-time high—up 2 percent with more unit visits than in 2017. Indeed, over the course of the last several years, each year you have visited more units than in the previous year. All three have served with distinction and taught me so much about their regions. I'd like to take a moment to tell you about some of their successes.

I've decided that Kandra Dickerson knows everyone in the Central Region, and everyone loves her. I had the privilege of team teaching with her once this winter and getting to watch firsthand how she responds to each individual, each need. Kandra has been a wonderful regional commissioner and I thank her for her service.

Ken King, Northeast regional commissioner, will be recognized with the Silver Buffalo at the National Annual Meeting for his service to youth. Part of that service has been through Scouting, and commissioner service in particular. On Ken's monthly calls,

Current Merit Badge Counselors and Guidelines:

The current roster of merit badge counselors is provided periodically to the Scoutmaster of each troop. If a scout needs information about a specific merit badge, the scout can contact their troop leadership or the George Mason Merit Badge Dean (note emails should include two adults - no one-on-one contact for electronic media).

To become a Merit Badge Counselor:

You will need to submit the following information to the **Merit Badge Dean**:

- Adult Application (Page 3 only just the applicant's initials and signature),
- Background Check Authorization (Page 15),
- Merit Badge Counselor Information Sheet, and
- Current YPT Certification (Login, Menu, My Dashboard, Completions).

DON'T BE THIS GUY



GET BCOLS TRAINED!

This course was developed by a group of Scouters in 1993; it has been continually updated to meet current techniques and technology. It is aimed at all adults working with older youth regardless of program (Boy Scouting, Venturing, or Exploring). This This training IS NOT recommended for Cub Scout leaders or people without camping experience. All participants are strongly encouraged to complete Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills, as well as the position-specific training for their program area (Venturing or, Boy Scout) prior to attending this course. All participants must be able to meet current physical requirements of the BSA Annual Health & Medical Record.

The target audience is adult leaders planning High Adventure treks at backcountry venues not supported by BSA infrastructure; however, units planning to attend High Adventure bases supported by BSA will find this course useful, inasmuch as unit shakedowns will, most likely, take place in venues not supported by BSA infrastructure. If you are participating in an NCAC-sponsored High Adventure Trek, you must also take the course offered by the NCAC High Adventure Committee.

High Adventure Skills Resources Management Course

August 24 – 26, Need to attend all three days - Camp St. Charles, Newberg, MD

What is Powder Horn? Powder Horn is a resource course designed to introduce Scouting's adult leaders to exciting program possibilities using a variety of resources for their unit. It helps leaders to provide a robust outdoor program that meets the health and safety requirements as well as the rules and regulations of the BSA as they apply to outdoor programs. The goal for participants is to leave the Powder Horn course with a list of ideas to help their program, along with contacts and resources needed to implement them. It is important to understand that Powder Horn is not a personal development course or a team building experience. It is not a certification course. Its purpose is to educate the youth and adult Scouting leaders about specific high-adventure skills, to connect them to resources to deliver those skills, and to get them excited about delivering those skills in an exciting, challenging way to youth.

Who can attend Powder Horn?

All registered adult leaders are welcome. All participants must be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America. Adults must have completed Leader Specific Training for their registered position. All youth applications will be placed on a wait list until all adult applications are processed. Youth participants (14 and up) will be admitted on an individual basis and requires the completion of the Powder Horn Youth Application Addendum which includes the nomination by the unit leader. Youth must have completed their unit's version of leadership training (Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops or Crews, etc.). National Youth Leadership Training is recommended.

What will we do? Powder Horn is organized around the BSA's High Adventure elements. Topics may include:

What is the Course Size? The course is limited to 40 participants.

- We are not able to accept youth registration on a first come-first served basis. All youth will be placed on a wait-list and asked to complete the Powder Horn Youth Application Addendum via email. The addendum will be used to evaluate all youth registrations. Youth will be notified of the status of their application by June 7, 2019.
