## Volunteer – Just Do It!

If you're reading this article, you're probably an adult volunteer in the Boy Scouts of America or another Scouting organization. We were the ones who took a step forward – or stayed in place when everyone else stepped back – and found ourselves in a job we didn't know much about at first, other than it would help the pack go, or allow us to be with our children and have some fun and adventures with them and their friends.

When I first volunteered to be a den leader, our Cubmaster told me that I needed to do two things – go to basic training, and attend Roundtable each month. Wanting to not let down the boys in my den, I went and got trained, and each month I joined our Cubmaster and many others at Roundtable.

At these events, I marveled at the knowledge and experience of the volunteers leading the sessions. One after another, the trainers at Cub Scout Leader Basic Training taught us about den and pack meetings, the psychology of boys, how to maintain order, how to make den meetings more fun, how to safely take them on field trips, and lots of other great information, all packed into a Saturday morning and afternoon. And each month at Roundtable, I saw the session leaders having fun telling us all about what's going on in our council and how to do what we need to do this month and next.

The thought crossed my mind that even though I was still starting out in the great world of Scout leadership, would it be possible some day that I could be one of those trainers or Roundtable leaders? Certainly I wasn't that great in speaking to groups, though being a den leader can help give you nerves of steel. And I didn't know what they knew – that's why I was there, after all.

But as time went by, I thought about it more and more, and one day, one of the Roundtable staffers who noticed that I had been at every Roundtable that year – and asked and answered a lot of questions – took me aside and asked me if I'd be willing to lead a short segment at the next Roundtable. I quickly agreed, and the next month I did a quick demo of how to tie a couple basic knots.

This simple act – being asked to take on a small role – inspired me to do more, and soon I was volunteering to help with more things at Roundtable – anything from making the coffee to leading breakout sessions. And I sought out the training chair for our district and asked her if she could use some help as well. I was welcomed with open arms and soon I was spending a couple Saturdays a month helping to train new Cub Scout leaders, of which I had been one just a couple years earlier.

Had I not overcome the hesitation to “just do it” and volunteer to help out at the district level, I wouldn't have had the experience of meeting and getting to know so many great folks who share the common interest in our children to provide them with as great a Scouting program as we can. And as a district volunteer, I'm always pleased when someone comes to me and volunteers to do something. I think you'll find it the same way in your area. You'll be welcomed and appreciated, whether it's helping with training new leaders, running a day camp event, making a Friends of Scouting presentation, counseling a merit badge, or giving back as a commissioner. There are many, many ways that we can help serve youth – find something that interests you and do it!.

### District Camporee



The GCD Spring Camporee will be held on March 29-31 and will take place at Camp Highroad ( 21164 Steptoe Hill Road, Middleburg, VA 20117).

The Camporee focuses on outdoor Scouting fun as embodied in the theme, "Outdoor Adventure Challenge." This event is designed for Boy Scout Troops, Varsity Teams and Venturing Crews.

The Camporee consists of two major events: a Patrol Challenge of six events, and an Adventure Choice period, for Scouts to be able to explore challenging "High Adventure" program activities (additional fees apply). Each Unit will have an assigned period for each event, so that everyone will have equal opportunity for full participation

All participants must register and pay the Camporee Fee online thru the NCAC website. The Camporee fee is \$24 per participant (all Youth and Adults) and includes all campsite and facility costs.

The date for the Goose Creek's annual Webelos-o-ree is set for October 12-13, 2019 at Camp Snyder. This event is open to all Webelos so mark the date down on your calendar now. Note: Those that are currently Bears will be Webelos this fall and are eligible to attend.

This camping event is designed to show Webelos and their parents what a Scout BSA troop is all about. The activities will be run by our own troops and can include such things as: Fire building, cooking, monkey bridge, BB shooting and/or archery, first aid, knife safety. We provide dinner and in the evening there is a campfire run by the Order of the Arrow. For the adults we'll provide plenty of Scout leaders to answer questions about camping, joining a troop, and camping equipment. We will also hold a Webelos to Scout orientation for Arrow of Light Scouts.

The Webelos-o-ree starts off with an opening ceremony Saturday morning and wraps up Sunday after chapel services. For those who don't want to camp over, there are also registration options for staying just for the activity periods and for joining us for dinner and the campfire before going home.

Awards will be given to the top 5 finishers in each of the ranks at the District Derby. This means we will have separate races for the Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts. The top 5 finishers from each rank will move onto the Championship Finals and the top 3 finishers will be awarded trophies.

In addition, we will hold a Siblings Race and the top 3 finishers will be awarded medals.

## Day/Twilight Camp 2019



Goose Creek Day Camp and Twilight Camp - June 17-21 at the 4H Fairgrounds in Leesburg.

Cub Scout day camps are organized by the National Capital Area Council, Boy Scouts of America and conducted by volunteers from the local area. Day camps are for registered Cub Scouts entering the 1st-5th grades the following school year. Those entering the 1st grade must be accompanied by an 'adult partner' during their participation. Twilight camps are the same as day camps but held in the evening, as such they have shorter hours and eliminate a few of the activities that occur at day camp.

Day camps are conducted by adult volunteer leadership who were trained and certified at one of the Boy Scouts of America's National Camping Schools. Day camps are also supported by a number of adult and youth staff members. Boy Scout Den Chiefs may also support the day camp program by assisting the Cub Scouts throughout the camp.

Most camps include activities based on STEM, nature, shooting sports, games, and possibly aquatics. Adult volunteers make up the nucleus of the day camp staff by volunteering in positions to lead specific programs, support the general operation, or by managing a den of Cub Scouts throughout their time at camp.

### ★ Order of the Arrow Elections Change - Venture Members and Sea Scouts now eligible (including young ladies)



The Order of the Arrow is Scouting's National Honor Society. Its purpose is to recognize those who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives, to promote camping, to develop leaders, and to crystallize helpfulness into a life purpose of cheerful service to others.

The only way a scout can become a candidate for membership in the Order of the Arrow is to be elected by his troop. Each troop may have one election each year. A scout becomes eligible for election by attaining the First Class rank, having 15 or more days and nights of camping in the previous two years, and having his scoutmaster's approval. The fifteen days and nights of camping must include one (and only one) period of long-term camping of five nights, and all camping must be under the auspices of the Boy Scouts of America.

Beginning February 1, 2019, Venture Crews and Sea Scout Ships may elect candidates for admission to the Order of the Arrow. A scout in those units becomes eligible for election if he (she) (1) meets the camping requirement, (2) holds the Venturing Discovery Award or the Sea Scout Ordinary rank (or higher), and (3) has the approval of the Venturing Crew Advisor or the Sea Scout Skipper. The camping requirement for Venturing Crew members or Sea Scouts is identical to that for members of Troops: fifteen days and nights of BSA camping in the previous two years, including one period of five nights of long-term camping. Ship nights may be counted for Sea Scouts.

Scouts who are elected become members of the Order of the Arrow when they complete a series of tests at an "Ordeal." New members make a pledge of service to others.

While the Goose Creek Order of the Arrow Chapter is conducting unit election through May 31, it is recommended that a unit election be held prior to April 1. The early election allows all elected candidates to plan for and attend the Goose Creek Chapter ordeal the weekend of May 10-12. Candidates who find that date inconvenient may arrange to attend an ordeal sponsored by a different chapter on a more convenient date. Elections may be scheduled at

Life Scouts and their parents are strongly encouraged to attend as well. The key goal is to get each of the unit Eagle Advisers up to speed on changes to the process, and some of the district-level mechanics of same. That way, they can help share the message to the Life Scouts in their units on a more frequent basis.

Lots of things have changed over the years, and even the long-standing and experienced L2E Advisers will learn something new.



## 2019 Guide to Advancement



The *Guide to Advancement* (GTA) is updated periodically in response to changes to programs, requirements, and policies, as well as comments and recommendations received by the National Advancement Program Team. The *Guide to Advancement 2019* is now the “current edition.” It can be found online at [www.scouting.org/advancement](http://www.scouting.org/advancement) in both HTML and PDF format. Printed copies will soon be available in your local Scout shop for purchase, if they are not already there, but when shopping note that the SKU is 648216, and the publication number, 33088, has not changed, so be sure to ask for the *Guide to Advancement 2019*.

The 2019 edition replaces all previous editions of the *GTA* and any other advancement manuals. It is the source for all advancement policies and procedures and, unless specifically exempted, it supersedes any BSA publications that may conflict with it. Every section of the 2019 guide has received some minor revisions since the last printed edition, primarily to reflect the addition of female youth to Cub Scouting and Scouts BSA.

In general, revisions have been made throughout this guide to make clear that all guidance and requirements of the rank advancement and awards programs apply equally to male and female Scouts. All references to the Varsity program have been removed, except when past participation in a Varsity team could be relevant, such as service in a position of responsibility. To reflect the Bylaws of the Boy Scouts of America, the objectives of Scouting, otherwise known as the aims, have been modified wherever they appear to include character development, citizenship training, leadership, and mental and physical fitness. When used throughout this guide, *Scouts BSA Handbook* refers to both the *Scouts BSA Handbook for Boys* and the *Scouts BSA Handbook for Girls*.

In this day and age of a broader international community, more frequent global travel, and multi-national job reassignments to include military and other government-related personnel movements, it is not uncommon to have Scouts from another country joining a new or transferring into a BSA unit. In the case of Scouts who have earned rank advancements in another country’s Scouting program and wish to have them credited into an equivalent BSA rank, BSA has established rules and requirements to be followed, which can be found in *Guide To Advancement 2019* topic 5.0.4.0 (Youth from Other Countries).

This section provides guidance as to which youth are involved, registration procedures, and other specific details for determining the equivalency and/or applicability of requirements for determination of a BSA rank. For example, the procedures laid out in the topic apply to all ranks except Eagle Scout, which is not considered equivalent to any other Scouting association’s rank.

## Temporary Transition Rules for New Scouts BSA Members



The Boy Scouts of America is offering a one-time, limited exception to its age requirements for the Eagle Scout award, giving new Scouts BSA members, male and female, a fair chance to earn the program's top honor.

Traditionally, BSA rules say a young person can no longer earn Eagle once they turn 18. But for 16- and 17-year-olds who are new to Scouts BSA — even those who join on the Feb. 1, 2019, launch day — there isn't enough time to earn Eagle before their 18th birthday. By offering this one-time extension BSA is saying that everyone deserves a chance to work toward Eagle.

The move gives these Scouts the 19 or 20 months they'll need to meet all requirements while encouraging them to enjoy the journey toward Eagle, rather than simply racing to the finish line.

### Who is eligible for the temporary extension?

Eligibility is based on two factors:

1. The young person's age on Feb. 1, 2019. To be eligible, the young man or young woman must be at least 16 but not yet 18 on Feb. 1, 2019.
2. The date the young person joined Scouts BSA. To be eligible, the young man or young woman must register as a member of Scouts BSA on or before Dec. 31, 2019.

In the interest of fairness, these temporary transition rules apply to all youth joining Scouts BSA during 2019 — both girls and first-time-joining boys.

Boys who were members of a Boy Scout troop before Feb. 1, 2019, aren't considered first-time-joining boys and therefore are not eligible for the extension.

### How does a Scout apply for the extension?

Youth who want to apply for the extension must talk with their unit leader(s) to request the extension. The leader then accesses the youth's profile in My.Scouting. If the Scout is eligible, there will be a button the leader can select to indicate the youth has asked for the extension.

This request goes to the National Service Center in Texas. Once the request is approved, the youth, their parent, unit leader and council representative will receive an email with confirmation as well as the expiration date of the extension.

Other things to know:

- Requests for extensions must be received no later than 30 days after turning 18.
- Only the National Council may grant extensions.
- No exceptions to or waivers of any of the requirements for the Eagle Scout Award are permitted under this limited exception.
- All requirements must be completed while the individual is a registered member of Scouts BSA, or after achieving the First Class rank in Scouts BSA and moving to a Venturing crew or Sea Scout ship.

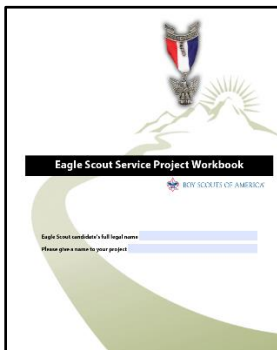
## New Eagle Scout Rank Application



An updated Eagle Scout Rank Application (ESRA) for 2019 has been posted. Scouts already in the process with the April 2017 version can continue using that form. Anybody starting to complete the ESRA must use the new form ([www.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/512-728\\_WB\\_fillable.pdf](http://www.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/512-728_WB_fillable.pdf)). Note: The Eagle Advancement page on the Council's website points to the same URL so that it always has the latest version.

Scoutbook users may download the ESRA by going to the bottom of the Scout's page, selecting Reports, then clicking on Eagle Application. A PDF version of the ESRA will open with the information from Scoutbook filled in. Save the file, then update as needed.

## New Eagle Project Workbook Available



As we move into 2019, there are some advancement changes in the offing. Significant is the issuance of a new Eagle Scout Project workbook, now available from the national forms library ([www.scouting.org/programs/boy-scouts/advancement-and-awards/eagle-scout-workbook/](http://www.scouting.org/programs/boy-scouts/advancement-and-awards/eagle-scout-workbook/)). Note: The Eagle Advancement page on the Council's website points to the same URL so that it always has the latest version.

The new form must be used for all Eagle projects started after January 1, 2019, but projects started using the old form can continue to use that form for the time being. The BSA will most likely sunset the old form, probably in a few months.

One change is the file format that the new workbook uses. While the file is a PDF, its fillable forms use the XML Forms Architecture (XFA), a proprietary specification family that requires a specific reader in order to open, fill and save the document. Most users will most likely be using computers running MacOS or Microsoft Windows, for which the latest Adobe Acrobat reader is readily available and should work just fine. Open-source users, however, may need to jump through some hoops, installing Adobe's reader manually or running the Windows version through an emulator or API layer (e.g. wine).

Changes noticed:

- Filling in the Scout's name and project title on the first page of the document will automatically copy it to the title page following page six of the instructions and everywhere else in the report requiring the name to appear, so don't get frustrated that you can't enter it there.
- Text boxes automatically resize to allow open-ended amounts of text. There's no need to fit them into fixed fields or attach additional pages.
- Likewise, you can insert as many photos (in a variety of formats) as you wish.
- As you enter the figures in the various numerical tables (cost estimate, materials list, etc.), the line and column totals automatically recalculate. For example, entering a quantity of 5 boards at \$15 each causes \$75 to appear in the Total Cost column.

### Wear This Patch to Show Off Your Status as a Founder of Your Unit



It's a small red strip of cloth, but its significance is massive.

The Founder's Bar lets youth and adult leaders show off their status as original members of a new pack, troop, crew or ship. It's a way to honor the hard work of these Scouting pioneers.

Any youth or adult who joins a new Scout unit within its first year of existence is eligible for the patch. The white-on-red strip is worn on the left sleeve — just below the unit numerals.

And what if you were a founding member of a unit formed years — or even decades — ago? You can wear the Founder's Bar on your shirt for that unit, as well.

#### Who is eligible to wear the Founder's Bar?

- Youth and adults whose names are on a new-unit charter
- Youth and adults who officially join a new unit before the unit recharter for the first time
- Members of veteran units still in operation who were on the original charter

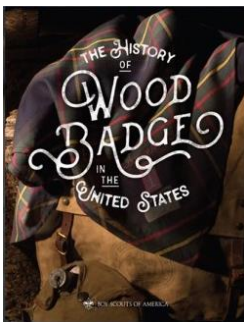
#### How is the Founder's Bar worn?

Sew the strip on the left sleeve — just below the unit numerals. Only wear the Founder's Bar with the appropriate unit numeral.

Let's say you're a founding member of Scouts BSA Troop 123 but not Cub Scout Pack 456. In that scenario, you'd only wear the Founder's Bar on your Scouts BSA uniform — right below the numbers 123.



### The History of Wood Badge in the United States



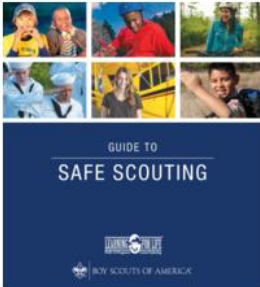

"Wood Badge has long been a powerful force for learning, inspiration and motivation for hundreds of thousands of Scout leaders throughout the world," BSA Chief Scout Executive Mike Surbaugh says in the book's introduction. "Wherever you go in Scouting, you find top leaders wearing Wood Badge beads."



## Guide to Safe Scouting Updated for 2019



Scouting safety is important enough that the guideposts we must follow are continuously reviewed and updated. The Boy Scouts of America maintains the latest version of the *Guide to Safe Scouting* online and provides a new printed version every year or so: [www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/toc/](http://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/toc/)

This year's *Guide* includes several changes and updates. Some, as usual, are cosmetic or represent wording changes and clarifications. Others revise sections or an entire chapter.

Here's a summary:

- **Scouts BSA:** With the change in the program name from Boy Scouts to Scouts BSA, editorial changes have been made to revise the wording. Wherever there were references to *Boy Scouts* or *Boy Scouting*, they now refer to *Scouts BSA*. In other areas, references to *Scouts* have been replaced with *youth* instead. And any mention of the *Boy Scout Handbook* now lists the *Scouts BSA Handbook* instead.
- **Adult supervision:** There's no change to the requirement that a female registered leader must be present when female youth members are participating in Scouting activities, but the wording on age has been clarified to specify *21 years of age or over* rather than just over 21.
- **Tenting:** Previously, it was advised that youth sharing tents be no more than two years apart in age. Now, the word *should* has been changed to *must*, making it a requirement.
- **Webelos camping:** Wording outlining parental supervision of Webelos Scouts on overnight den campouts was removed. Existing language stipulating that Webelos Den Leaders and parents are *expected* to accompany the youth on overnight trips is still in effect.
- **Campout site approval form:** The URL for the downloadable version is included in the text along with the BSA bin number.
- **References to online resources** have changed in many instances, and the new publication reflects the current URL of those forms and documents.
- **The chapter on Animal and Insect Hazards** was rewritten in its entirety. Previously, the chapter covered four major hazards: hantavirus, rabies, Lyme disease, and mosquito-borne illnesses. The new chapter has more general advice on being aware of all such hazards (not just those listed specifically), being prepared to encounter them, and a list of resources found online from the US Centers for Disease Control on mosquito, tick, wildlife, rodent, and rabies hazards. These are likely more comprehensive and current than what could be published in the *Guide*.
- **Incident reporting:** There is now a URL for the online incident reporting form, and it's listed in the *Guide*.
- **Event safety checklist:** The multi-page, multi-purpose checklist has been entirely revised. The new form has check boxes for the various areas and items, and is organized in a more logical manner to help facilitate event planning. Many new areas of concern have been added.

Every Scouter is expected to be familiar with what's in the *Guide to Safe Scouting* as a way of keeping youth safe while in our care. Bookmark or download the latest version, or purchase a copy at your Scout Shop, and keep it nearby any time you're with our youth.



## How to donate items to the National Scouting Museum



You're helping a relative clean their house, and as you're digging through an old trunk in the garage, you discover a Scout campaign hat and a merit badge sash stitched with old-style badges. Your relative doesn't want them; you don't want them, so what do you do? Well, they're dated and Scout-related, maybe they'd be perfect to display in the National Scouting Museum.

Before you box up the items and mail them, just know there's a preferred process for donating memorabilia to the museum, which opened this past summer at Philmont Scout Ranch.

The National Scouting Museum houses more than 600,000 items that tell the story of Scouting and its impact on American culture. It features the first Eagle Scout Award medal, given to Arthur Eldred in 1912, along with the merit badges he earned. It also has a collection of medals given to Scouts for their fundraising efforts during World War I, as well as a Lone Scout jacket from 1917.

"Our goal is to have an incredible collection of items, which are keystone pieces of our BSA history," says David Werhane, National Scouting Museum director. "With that in mind, we ask that anyone who is interested to contributing to the museums collection to contact us before sending objects."

Museum employees can go over what to expect for the item's usage, display and any tax deductions if the donation is accepted.

## The Learn Center: Home of Improved Online Training for Cub Scout Volunteers



Wow! Go to My.Scouting.Org and click on the Learn Center. You'll see an updated catalog of, simplified, succinct, topic-specific training modules for Cub Scout volunteers. In all, there are approximately 20 modules, and more may be added later.

Volunteers can now complete their training at a time and location (at home!) that is most convenient for them. The courses themselves are separated into tracks: one for den leaders and assistants; one for Cubmasters; and one for pack committee members. The modules are of varying lengths, some taking only a few minutes to complete. They can be taken individually, or, time permitting, one right after another. They can be accessed via computer or mobile device, including a smartphone. Completion of the required modules in each track will be recorded in the training record of each volunteer within the Learn Center. Completion of the track will qualify the volunteer to wear the "Trained" patch for their volunteer position.

Here is an example scenario: A new den leader or assistant who wants to know what to do before that allimportant first meeting can click on Before the First Meeting. There they will see several training modules that will be helpful, including How to Conduct a Cub Scout Den Meeting. Subsequent modules pertain to den management, how to involve adults to assist in Cub Scouting, childhood development, Cub Scout pack finances, keeping Cub Scouting safe, how to conduct a Cub Scout pack meeting, and many more.

## Wood Badge



Wood Badge is advanced Scout leader training that began in 1919 by Lord Baden-Powell, founder of Scouting and Wood Badge's first director. It came to America in 1948 and has been updated to reflect current BSA policies and programs. Incorporating the best techniques available, Wood Badge has become the most advanced leadership training course in Scouting!

Wood Badge is the highest level of Scout leadership training and provides you with the tools to be a superior leader. The leadership skills taught are for leaders from all Scouting areas including Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, Venturing and the district and council. The 1st half of the course utilizes a classroom environment and practical exercises to teach the essentials of leadership. You'll learn what makes leadership work for you in Scouting and your personal life. The 2nd half offers classroom and outdoor experiences to help you learn the application of leadership skills. Finally, you will write and complete a "Ticket". The "Ticket" consists of five written goals. These goals connect your new leadership knowledge to your role in Scouting.

Any Scouter who has attended basic training for their registered position and serves in a leadership role in Scouting or in a position that directly supports a unit can attend.

This spring's course will be held on May 3 – 5 & May 31 – June 2 at Camp Snyder. Both sessions must be attended.

## Swimming and Water Rescue (SWR)



**What:** This is the hands-on in-water training that is recommended in Safe Swim Defense guidelines for anyone who supervises Scout swimming activities. This course certifies leaders to conduct BSA swim classification tests and gives leaders the confidence in their water rescue capabilities needed to safely conduct swimming activities. This course replaced BSA Lifeguard as the training for unit leaders supervising unit swimming activities. This training is available at Camp Snyder and at Goshen Scout Reservation camp waterfronts during 2019 summer camp season.

**Prerequisites:** Safe Swim Defense (available online at <https://myscouting.scouting.org/>)

**Fee:** \$60 (includes the required course text – Aquatics Supervision No. 34737) \$30 if you already have the book.

**Who:** Older youth (min. 15 years old) and adult leaders.

## CPR/AED Pro and First Aid Training



**What:** This is the CPR/AED for the Professional Rescuer and First Aid training that is required for BSA Lifeguard requirement #6. This training is not usually included in BSA Lifeguard courses taught at summer camp. The course uses the Red Cross blended-learning version where you complete online work before the in-person skills session. Successful completion earns 2 American Red Cross course certifications.

**Minimum age:** 15 years old.

## Aquatics Supervision Training: Paddle Craft Safety (PCS)



**What:** This is the hands-on training that is recommended in Safety Afloat guidelines for anyone conducting Scout boating activities. Two versions of the course are offered: The Basic course covers flat water introductory boating skills and basic trip planning. The River course includes skills and knowledge development that are required for conducting trips on moving water. The Basic course is a prerequisite for the moving water course.

These courses are required for any NCAC Scouters who are leading James River Canoe Treks out of the Lenhok'sin High Adventure Camp.

Powder Horn is organized around the Venturing Program's High Adventure elements and Boy Scouting's High Adventure Merit badge elements. It is intended to help adult leaders get started finding and using the resources for high-adventure programs.

### Who can attend Powder Horn?

All registered adult leaders and youth (14 and up) are welcome. All participants must be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America. Adults must have completed Leader Specific Training for your registered position.

Youth participants will be provided a Personal Resource Questionnaire which must be completed by the applicant; a letter of recommendation from their Scoutmaster or Advisor is also required.

## Leave No Trace Trainer Course - Outdoor Ethics



### What is the purpose of this class?

The Cub Scout, Scouts BSA, Varsity Scout, Venturing, and Sea Scout programs all include outdoor stewardship, care for the environment, and Leave No Trace as part of their programs. This course is offered to train adults and youth aged 14+ to serve their units and districts as Leave No Trace Trainers and as Outdoor Ethics Guides. Every Cub Scout, Scouts BSA, Varsity Scout, Venturing, and Sea Scout unit should have at least one Leave No Trace Trainer/Outdoor Ethics Guide.

We recommend that youth complete this course before serving as in the troop Outdoor Ethics Guide position.

### Who should attend?

Venturers, Sea Scouts, Varsity Scouts, and Scouts BSA aged 14+; adult Cub Scout, Scouts BSA, Varsity, Venturing, and Sea Scout leaders; and District and Council leaders and trainers.

### What will I learn?

This course is designed to enhance your understanding of Leave No Trace practices and outdoor ethics, and to increase your level of expertise and confidence in teaching Leave No Trace skills. This class is both active and highly interactive. You will be introduced to concepts and methods that will advance your knowledge of Leave No Trace issues in both developed and high adventure environments, expand your repertoire of low-impact skills, and increase your effectiveness in teaching these important skills to others.

On completion of this course, participants will be registered as Leave No Trace Trainers with the Leave No Trace Center for Outdoor Ethics and with the BSA. Students will receive Leave No Trace teaching materials, a certificate of course completion, a Leave No Trace Trainer lapel pin and patch, and a BSA Leave No Trace Trainer card.

This course is instructed by nationally designated Leave No Trace Master Educators and Trainers. Attendance for the entire duration of the training is required.

(Campsite location, equipment list, and other course details will be emailed to participants a few weeks prior to the course. Each participant will have an assignment to prepare for the training.)

This course is taught entirely in the outdoors. We will camp out Saturday evening.

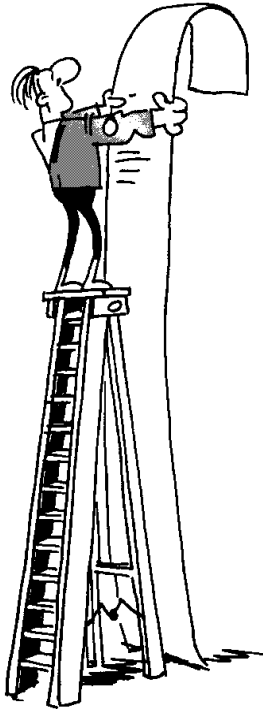
