2017 Charter Renewal

By now all Committee Chairmen of units should have received their Charter Renewal packet from the NCAC Registrar in Texas. Please advise your Unit Commissioner or ADC if this is not the case. Included in the packet is the access code for online registration and the transmittal envelope. Online registration is anticipated to open ~October 1_{st}.

Some process tips to make for a smooth submission:

Immediately: Submit applications as soon as completed. Don't wait to submit applications in the Charter Renewal submission.

October: The assigned Unit processor should log into Unit Charter Renewal System (UCRS); the team obtains applications and YPT certificates as needed, and fees; processor 'Updates Unit Roster' to pull in new data; unit Key 3 to review, and meet with Chartering Organization head for signatures on final; and the processor 'Submits to Council' via UCRS.

<u>November:</u> Turn-in completed work product and completely initially transmittal envelope to unit commissioner for review and endorsement NLT **November 20, 2016**.

JTE is Your Unit's Scorecard for Scouting Success

How do you know whether your unit offers the best possible experience for the youth you serve?

You keep score.

JTE is your unit's scorecard for Scouting success. As we begin this last quarter of the calendar year, **now is the time for all units to focus on finalizing your 2016 JTE scorecards.**

While many might view these scorecards as trivial and not take this process seriously, *JTE is the most essential tool to ensure the success of the Scouting program in your unit.* Just like with most all things in life, the more effort you put into completing your JTE scorecard, the more your unit will get back in return. Here are three "best practices" to get the most benefit in completing your 2016 JTE scorecard.

1. Don't wait until November to start finalizing your unit's scorecard. Now is the time to make sure you have

all the required information to complete your unit's JTE scorecard. Refer to your 2016 JTE Guide-book (available at www.scouting.org/jte) for a list of the specific documents your unit needs to finalize your scorecard. Now would also be a good time to confirm that your unit has identified at least one individual with an account on the JTE Service Hours website (servicehours.scouting.org) who understands how to record your unit's service projects.

- 2. Get your entire unit leadership team involved. Your unit committee chair could certainly just "rubber stamp" your JTE scorecard and be done in a matter of a few minutes. However, to really get any meaningful assessment of your current unit's health, your entire unit leadership needs to meet and work together as a team to complete your scorecard. This meeting should include your unit key-3, unit committee members, youth leader group (patrol leaders' council, team leadership, crew officers or petty officers), and your unit commissioner. When your entire leadership team is completely open and honest about documenting your unit's performance, your JTE scorecard will clearly show you where your unit can deliver an even stronger Scouting program. This process works best when your unit leaders work together as a team and let go of their egos and emotions.
- 3. Communicate your results with your unit. Consistent communication is the hallmark of a unit deter-mined to offering the best possible Scouting experience. By sharing your JTE scorecard results with your entire unit, you build trust and motivate others to en-gage in helping achieve your unit's goals. Let your entire unit know the specific areas where you are doing well and also the particular areas where your unit needs help. Open and honest communication about your scorecard results is essential to building a stronger Scouting program in your unit.

If you have any questions or concerns about your unit's scorecard or about any other JTE issues, please reach out to your unit com-missioner. Our commissioner corps is dedicated to helping your unit offer the best possible experience for the youth you serve.

Validate your Unit's contact information on www.BeAScout.scouting.org so that new families to the area can find you. Don't depend on "Back to School Night" for your recruits. By that time, your target audience has already committed to other activities. Remember you're recruiting parents, convincing them that scouting is a valuable activity for their youth.

BE VISIBLE. Ideas you may want to consider as you review the 2016-2017 school year calendar and your school's website.

- Open houses and initial, back-to-school PTA meetings: Usually held the week before school starts and are school specific.
- Fun Fairs and school bazaars.
- Book Fairs: Donate scout bookmarks with your contact information.
- Door hangers. Your school may not support flyers going home and a parent will more likely remember your Unit if they have something in their hand that they can attach to the refrigerator.
- Take pictures. Everyone has a smart phone and everyone takes pictures. Get those pictures posted in the newspaper, your website/Facebook page, charter organization website/Facebook page, the District Facebook page. A caption is all that's required.
- Posting the picture quickly is essential for good results.



Hello Troops of Prince George's District,

Your Scouts have a rare chance to participate in one of the great Boy Scout events -- the 2017 National Jamboree! Over 30,000 Scouts and leaders will camp together at the Summit Bechtel Reserve, West Virginia, during July 19-28, 2017. As a member of a council contingent troop, he will be participating in many exciting, interesting, and fun activities. There will of course be the chance to get in 9 good nights of camping. But, most of all, your son will be experiencing the fellowship of national and worldwide Scouting like he could nowhere else. The phrase "brotherhood of Scouting" really comes alive! Couple this with the fact that a National Jamboree is held only once every four years, and you can see how special an opportunity this is!

Unlike regular summer camp, the jamboree is much more activity-oriented rather than advancement-oriented. To help you and your Scouts get a better picture of what a jamboree is all about, I'm willing to visit one of your upcoming troop meetings in Oct to make a short slide/video presentation. I will try and make any date work for you – please let me know. If you don't want me to visit, that's fine – but I ask that you please provide the information to your troop families.

Our council has a quota on the number of Scouts and leaders it can send, and slots are filled on a first-come, first-served basis. For past jamborees, these spaces have filled up in September...that is, now! To sign up for the jamboree, here is the process:

Create an account for the Scout - http://my.scouting.org/

The cost per Scout has been set by the National Capital Area Council at \$1250, \$737 of which is due upon application, the remainder due in Jan 2017. Admittedly this is a lot of money, but consider that all of the fee is not due at once, and also there is half a year for the Scouts to earn some money to help him pay for this once-in-a-lifetime adventure. In addition, *our council is making available special camperships just for the jamboree* - form is attached. NCAC has targeted Prince George's District as an "underrepresented" area for the jamboree, so signups from our area would be very welcome. But, since spaces are filling up even as you read this letter, we must act quickly lest this opportunity pass by.

As a contingent troop leader for six jamborees between 1989 and 2010 (and selected to be a leader for 2017), I can personally attest that this is a highlight event in a Scout's life. Sure, there will be other jamborees, but never again will there be one at this point in your Scout's career. *I urge you to seriously consider this opportunity for all your eligible troop Scouts, and encourage sign ups without delay* - this week if at all possible. Our council is nearing its quota of youth participants, and contingent troops will be formed very soon. Many Prince George's troops have a long history of jamboree participation - it would be great to have a "PG" jamboree troop!

Time is running out...signing up now (in the next week) and paying will all but assure PG District Scouts will be in the same jamboree troop. Signing up later is possible, but will likely put them on a waiting list or in a jamboree troop based in a different area of the council (i.e., much further away).
