Duke of Edinburgh Award

- Who: The age range for the award is 14-25, and can be worked on concurrently with Scouting, however, there is <u>no grandfathering</u>. Adults working on this award with youth must be YPT trained
- What: Internationally recognized award that has four components (<u>voluntary service, skill, physical recreation, and an adventurous journey</u>). Three award levels: <u>gold, silver, and bronze</u>. Cost is \$100-150 per Scout per award level selected. Financial aid is available to those who qualify.
- Why: This awards provides another opportunity for Scouts to demonstrate leadership, character, service, and outdoorsmanship. Previously the British Ambassador to the US presented the awards
- When: The time commitment depending on the award level varies from <u>6 to 12-15 mos.</u>

DoE Bronze Award

- Age: 14+
- Male / Female
- Cost: \$100 per participant (one time fee)
 - Financial assistance is available
- Requirements: 6 months total
 - Voluntary Service (3 Mos): Make a positive contribution to society
 Ex. Community service, environmental work, charity, emergency service work
 - Physical Recreation (3 Mos): improve fitness, pursue healthy lifestyle
 Ex. Team / individual sports (rec / school-based)
 - Skills (3 Mos): Develop talents, broaden abilities (Must be different than physical rec and voluntary service)
 - Ex. Music, arts, sports, communication
 - Adventurous Journey (2 Days / 1 Night): Spirit of adventure, gain a deeper understanding of the great outdoors
 - Need a team goal; daily activity time of 6 hrs
 - Teams of 4-7
 - 3 parts: Training and Preparation, Practice Journey (at least one day / one night), Qualifying Journey
 - Ex. Hiking, Bike packing, canoeing, etc.
 - Write and submit report
 - Select activities and measurable goals
 - Need an assessor for each activity (independent expert)
 - Complete activities for a minimum of 1 hour per week on average
 - Log activities on online record book





DoE Silver Award

- Age: 15+
- Male / Female
- Cost: \$125 per participant (one time fee)
 - Financial assistance is available
- Requirements: 12 months total
 - Voluntary Service (6 Mos): Make a positive contribution to society
 Ex. Community service, environmental work, charity, emergency service work
 - Physical Recreation (6 Mos): improve fitness, pursue healthy lifestyle
 - Ex. Team / individual sports (rec / school-based)
 - Skills (6 Mos): Develop talents, broaden abilities (Must be different than physical rec and voluntary service)
 Ex. Music, arts, sports, communication
 - Adventurous Journey (3 Days / 2 Night): Spirit of adventure, gain a deeper understanding of the great outdoors
 - Need a team goal; daily activity time of 7 hrs
 - Teams of 4-7
 - 3 parts: Training and Preparation, Practice Journey (at least one day / one night), Qualifying Journey
 - Ex. Hiking, Bike packing, canoeing, etc.
 - Write and submit report
 - * Plus an additional 6 months of a major section if Bronze Award not completed
 - Select activities and measurable goals
 - Need an assessor for each activity (independent expert)
 - Complete activities for a minimum of 1 hour per week on average
 - Log activities on online record book



DoE Gold Award

- Age: 16+
- Male / Female
- Cost: \$150 per participant (one time fee)
 - Financial assistance is available
- Requirements: 18 months total
 - Voluntary Service (12 Mos): Make a positive contribution to society
 Ex. Community service, environmental work, charity, emergency service work
 - Physical Recreation (12 Mos): improve fitness, pursue healthy lifestyle
 Ex. Team / individual sports (rec / school-based)
 - Skills (12 Mos): Develop talents, broaden abilities (Must be different than physical rec and voluntary service)
 - Ex. Music, arts, sports, communication
 - Adventurous Journey (4 Days / 3 Night): Spirit of adventure, gain a deeper understanding of the great outdoors
 - Need a team goal; daily activity time of 8 hrs
 - Teams of 4-7
 - 3 parts: Training and Preparation, Practice Journey (at least one day / one night), Qualifying Journey
 - Ex. Hiking, Bike packing, canoeing, etc.
 - Write and submit report
 - * Plus an additional 6 months of a major section if Bronze Award not completed
 - Select activities and measurable goals
 - Need an assessor for each activity (independent expert)
 - Complete activities for a minimum of 1 hour per week on average
 - Log activities on online record book






DoE Gold Award – Gold Project

- 5 Days / 4 Nights
- Work with people from different backgrounds
- · Build confidence in new environments
- Choose a unique project in a residential setting (doesn't include everyday peer group)
- Examples:
 - Whitewater rafting (or Northern Tier / Sea Base?)
 - Historic Reenactment (1st Virginia Regiment at Mount Vernon?)
 - Building new hiking trails (Philmont?)
 - Leader at children's camp (staff at Scout camp? Staff at National and/or World Jambo?)
 - Learning a new language at a foreign language immersion camp
 - Attending a conference as a youth representative (NOAC?)



Roles and Responsibilities

- Award Coordinator: Manages the delivery of the award within org. Main contact between Award USA and Award Center
- Award Leader: Work directly with youth. Sign off on completion of activities.
- AJ Supervisor: Communication focal point. Ensures safety of participants. Ensures AJ meets requirements
- AJ Assessor: Ensures AJ conditions have been fulfilled by each team. Advises teams. Provides feedback to teams
- Activity Assessor: Adult volunteer, experienced / knowledgeable in activity. Approve progress
- Adventurous Journey (Adults): experience / training / registration
- Scouts: participants
